Flossenburg Remembrance

The American Legion Post NL01, Margrten, was recently asked if we could represent the American Legion at a ceremony to be held 19 January in the city of Spa Belgium. For me little was known about the ceremony, thinking it was to remember military victims of the Second World War. We were to learn it went way beyond that. The ceremony in Spa was to honor victims of the Flossenburg concentration camp, the 4th largest camp in Germany. This particular camp was a granite rock quarry in the Bavaria, 10 km from the Czech border. This granite was used during the construction of the Nazi Party Congress Center in Nuremburg.

The camp was established in May of 1938 and received it's first occupants on the 3rd of May. This camp functioned until April 23, 1945, when the 90th Infantry Division liberated it. Flossenburg camp functioned

with 90 commandos and inventoried 84,000 men and 16,000 women from 30 different nations. When the prisoner's arrived they were told, "if they worked well, you will end up there" pointing to the crematorium "and you will go out by the chimney and there you will be free". In the evening the thought of every person was, 'how to survive the next day'.

This remembrance ceremony was held in the city center of Spa, where stands a monument containing the ashes, thought to have been brought back to Spa in 1949 by Mrs. Angele Willemet, whose husband died in Flossenburg on March 22, 1945. These ceremonies have been established by the child of the victims of Flossenburg and the children of the survivors of these atrocities who finally told of their experiences to their children several years later (1995).

Attending the ceremony, along with our Sgt-at-Arms Mark Chernek, we were honored and humbled having been asked to participate in this moving and emotional remembrance. It is not just the military, the soldiers, the airmen, that faced danger and death but the civilian populace caught in the occupied areas.

They also should NEVER BE FORGOTTEN!

Flossenburg Remembrance Speeches

Why are we here today to remember the Flossenbürg concentration camp, the 4th largest camp in Germany with Dachau, Sachsenhausen and Buchenwald?

Flossenbürg is a village in Bavaria, 10 km from the Czech border; this place was interesting because of its large granite depostis. This granite was used during the construction of the Nazi Party Congress Center in Nuremberg, known for the disproportionate gatherings of Hitler's army. The camp was established in May 1938 and the first prisoners arrived on May 3rd. Until 1945 Flossenbürg camp and its 90 commandos inventoried 84.000 men and 16.000 women from 30 different nations. In Flossenbürg, extermination was done by working in the quarry. When he arrived at the camp, an SS explained to my father: if you work well, you will end up there, pointing the crematorium, and you will go out by the chimney and there you will be free. In the evening the thought of every prisoner was: how to survive the next day?

The camp was liberated on April 23, 1945 by the 90th US Infantry Division.

How and why the Victory Monument contains an urn with Flossenbürg ashes?

We owe this um to Mrs. Angèle Willemet. Her husband, Jules Willemet died on March 22, 1945. She made her first annual pilgrimage to Flossenbürg in 1949 with a group of 10 widows and 2 orphans. In August 1951 she founded the Flossenbürg Friendship Committee, of which she was the president until her death on April 30, 1985, at the age of 88. I found traces of 8 urns of ashes that she brought back to Belgium: the first was for Breendonk in 1952. On May 1959 a Flossenbürg box of earth was deposited at the Enclos des Fusillés in Liège. The other urns are in Mechelen, Ostend, Menin, Jodoigne, the National Monument to the Resistance in Liège, Mons and here in Spa where the urn was delivered on May 6, 1973.

Why this ceremony? First of all because my father was interned for 13 months in Flossenbürg before being transferred to Sachsenhausen, near Berlin. Until 1995 I never heard of my fathers' past. At the annual ceremony that same year, I saw my father crying for the first time on the steps of the crematorium. I discovered all the atrocities he had experienced during those 13 months. I discovered a man who had to fight to survive in this hell, not as Charles Dekeyser but as number 2264. Thanks to the initiative of Mister Karl-Heinz Lambertz, here present, a film was made about his life. The title: «I had an unbelievable chance » also refers to the capo of his barracks, Emile, who repeatedly pulled him out of range to be shot or hanged. Because death there was a game: one picked 3 or 4 numbers and without any reason, your life stopped

We all have a duty to remember. By your presence here, you participate. We do not have the right to forget this part of the history, what our parents, and grandparents lived, what they fought for.

Today for a few moments we have remembered: Alexander Hurard, Henr Terryn, Paul Froidthier, Victor Pochet and many others because it is also forgetfulness that kills.



Henri Terryn, born in 1912, was our father.

Accused of being in the Resistance, the Gestapo came to our house to arrest him on March 27, 1944. He was in fact part of the Resistance Groups.

He was imprisoned in the St Gilles prison, where our mother's only happiness was to visit him.

We had little mail from him, saying all the love he had for his wife and daughters. He wanted to know how we were doing and always told us to stay in good spirits.

He was transferred on July 29, 1944 to the Beverloo Camp. Two little papers that he threw from the train that led him to hell were recovered by brave railroad workers and delivered to our mother.

On the first note was written: passed through Liege on August 12th direction Germany. Notify my wife. My spirit is good. Hope that you and the girls are doing fine. See you soon.

On the second not was written: Passed through Angleur on August 18th in the direction of Verviers to Germany. Kisses to you and the children. They are done!!

In each of his letters, Dad asked to inform the families of other prisoners who were on the same train.

Dad was tried in Nurenberg and then deported on December 16th 1944 to the Flossenbürg concentration camp in Bavaria.

Our father died on January 19th, 1945. Exactly 73 years ago today.

We are here with you today in his memory and in memory of all those who died to defend our country and to liberate Belgium from the Nazis.

Mister Jean Lucas, prisoner of war, Dear families and friends of deportees, Ladies and Gentlemen

The 3rd Reich caused a lot of horror in Europe as well as for Belgian families and soiled the name of Germany.

Germany still has to be ashamed for that. We regret and are sad to have caused so much sadness.

So I'm very grateful to have been invited to your commemoration, here at Spa, which allows me to express my compassion, as well of that of Flossenburg and their parish

Having a fractured pelvis, I cannot be here today but my son Lorenz offered to represent me and to convey my thoughts.

Thank you all for extending your hand of reconciliation! But even more: throughout the meetings since the annual commemorations of 1995, we have been able to establish very strong friendships with former Belgian deportees, their families and their friends. We can cry together but also party and laugh. That's wonderful!

This must give us strength for the future! By planning and perfecting evil, Nazi horrors can never be matched or exceeded. However, racism, the « superior race », and torture, are still in this world and following the global migration to which the whole world is responsible for, they celebrate their return in force

Oppose ourselves in word and action to everyone in context. We are all equal. No matter the color of the skin, the culture, the religion, we are all children of God whom he loves in the same way as a father and a mother





Faces of Margraten: May 2-6, 2018; Search for Photos

Rows, endless rows of white marble crosses and stars of David. This is what one sees when overlooking the American War Cemetery and Memorial Netherlands in Margraten, the Netherlands. 8,301 American soldiers have been buried in this cemetery; another 1,722 names are listed on the Walls of the Missing. We do know the names

of all these men and women, but who were they? Where did they come from and what did their lives look like prior to World War II? The Stichting Verenigde Adoptanten Amerikaanse Oorlogsgraven (SVAAO)(Foundation United Adopters American War Graves) hopes to make a unique tribute to the men and women buried there by trying to give as many names of the soldiers buried in or memorialized at the Margraten Cemetery as possible a face, by decorating their graves or names on the Walls of the Missing with a personal photo through the project "The Faces of Margraten" during a Memorial week once every two years.

During the second edition of The Faces of Margraten tribute in 2016 we were able to put a face to 4,000 names. However, thousands of photos continue to be missing. Do you have a photo of a soldier buried or memorialized in Margraten? Please submit it then through <u>this page</u>. It will mean another soldier whom we can give a face in 2018.

Currently I'm the 2nd Vice Commander for what I think is the best American Legion in the world! I have been humbled and honored to work with these dedicated individuals who have at one time been a part or still is defending this great country of ours!







Letters [™] Dad

Letters journal of air force sergeant dennis owens during the air war of desert storm - 1991

The following are excerpts from the daily journal kept by Post NL01 Legionnaire, USAF Sergeant Dennis P. Owens during his tour of duty as an aircrew member in an E-3A AWACS in Desert Storm. He was the computer system technician. It is presented exactly as he wrote it.

Dear Dad: Noon 15 Jan 91

Well this is the D-Day, actually 0800 on Jan 16 my time = midnight EST Jan 15 the deadline for Insane [Saddem Hussein]. So far since 7 Jan 91 when I left the states I've logged 48.6 hours of flying time. That's 17.3 getting over here [from Tinker AFB, Oklahoma] and 2 flights already. My crew is scheduled fly our third mission tonight. Showtime [crew briefing] is 6:15 pm tonight. It will be a 15 hour mission. We will be airborne tomorrow at the 0800 deadline. Most of us on my crew do not know what the plan is yet. We will be briefed when we land tomorrow. We will have a part in the action we are told.

We thought the war started last night and then realized what happened was pretty funny after the fact: We got a report that a company size group of tanks were 8 miles south of the Kuwait border heading south. The call was made to the nearest tanks in the area. They proceeded north to intercept them. We got another report that some of our tanks were surrounded by 'blacked out' tanks - send help. Well, the radio call was received by the tanks that were doing the surrounding. Both sets of tanks were U.S. Nobody fired a shot.

When we arrived, the allotted villas in the AWACS area were full. We have the best 14 crews AWACS has. My crew was handpicked by Col. Bliss. They have five of our crews in a high rise building. Each crew has 2 apartments. Each apartment has 5 bedrooms, 3 baths, a kitchen, and one common area room. We are on the 5th floor, that equates to 126 stairs to climb. There is NO furniture in the apartment at all. We have a mummy sleeping bag and a cot. However, there is a telephone and a TV/VCR. We now get AFRTS [Armed Forces Radio and Television Service] live which is a plus. We can receive CNN live when they show it. There is no refrigerator or water cooler. We drink bottled water which we carry up those 126 stairs. I'm writing this letter on a plywood pallet on 12 water bottle boxes.

The food over here is good. The 4 army chow tents are OK. The flying is long. The jets are in pretty good shape. Now, those guys that bust their butts for us, are the maintenance folks over here. Not only are the jets'781's[AF Form 781, Aircraft Maintenance Log] in good shape along with the equipment, but those are clean planes out there. Those [maintenance] guys have and show pride in what they do.

The mood over here is very good as we face the next few days. By the time you get this letter, the war should have started and all my anxiety would have been answered. I suspect they will arm us with .38 [revolvers] tonight. My main concern is not self defense if we crash land, but defense on the bus on the 20 minute ride to and from the base. We are the most vulnerable on that long ride. They say we will have a SP [Security Police] es- cort and .38's on our side. But when?

Hey, get this, it's now 1600 [4:00pm], 15 Jan 91 over here. That's only 16 more shopping hours for Insane. Col. Voellger, the 552d AWAC Wing Commander is over here. Here's a quote from him: "The quickest way home is through Baghdad." I agree and we are ready. Hair raised and butts puckered, we're going in! Say a prayer for us. Love, Dennis

We also had a visit with the US Ambassador to the Netherlands Mr. Pete Hoekstra. We traded him a Department of France Centennial coin for one of his!

















How to Become A Sentinel of Memory

Over the past year the Ameican Overseas Memorial Day Association (AOMDA) Foundation has been focusing on the the restructing the adoption program of over 14,000 American soldiers who have their last resting place in Belgium. The program to honor our fallen is call the Sentinel of Memory program. Last issue I wrote about what the program consists of. This article will cover the steps on becoming a Primary Sentinel of Memory.

- **1.** Go to <u>www.aomda.org</u> and choose the language of your preference.
- **2.** Click on "Register" and follow the instruction on the form. Your request is usually approved within 24 hours. Mine was a little over 48 hrs.
- **3.** If your registration was successful, go to the site and click "Login" Give your email address and password.
- **4.** You are now automatically linked to the page for your personal account. Please take the time to fill in your profile information so that they can effectively reach you in the future.
- **5.** Click on "Honor Them" and then click on "Serve as a Sentinel of Memory". Once that page comes up, click on the hyperlink "Primary" Sentinel of Memory"
- **6.** Fill out the Primary Sentinel of Memory Application. Make sure you give full detailed answers. Make sure you select the right cemetery. You will also be asked why you are able to fulfill the obligations of being a Primary Sentinel at the cemetery you selected. Saying you live locally and normally visit the selected cemetery a couple of times a year is an acceptable answer. If you're interested in a particular serviceman please provide his name. You will also have the option to select to be put on a waiting list or be assigned any available serviceman.
- 7. Once you have completed the form, click on "Send". Your application will be forwarded to the Administrator for the Remembrance Honors. After approximately 72 hours you will receive an answer. Mine took closer to 6 to 8 weeks but that was when the AOMDA was still getting going through the 14,000 graves. Should be much quicker now. Your name will then be on the page of the serviceman your Primary Sentinel for. (if you don't want your name to appear on his page, you can make that adjustment through the privacy settings of your account)
- **8.** You will receive an email from the AOMDA with your serviceman's information and a Certificate of Appreciation for your commitment to serve as a Primary Sentinel of Memory. The pledges last for three years and you will be sent an email when the end of your pledge nears with the option to renew.

Department of France Centennial Challenge Coin!

March 2019 is firmly circled on The American Legion Dept. of France calendar. That's when Legionnaires across Europe will celebrate the organization's 100th birthday in Paris, where a gathering of soldiers, sailors and Marines that month in 1919 gave birth to what would become the largest organization of U.S. veterans. To honor the centennial, and to help cover anticipated costs of celebrating the anniversary, the Department of France has struck a commemorative challenge coin. The coins have been purchased by members, collectors and post leaders to distribute among military personnel, supporters and others who help the department fulfill the Legion mission in communities overseas. The challenge coin features the Eiffel Tower – the image of which is embroidered on Department of France Legion caps – above the organization's national 100th anniversary logo. On the flip side appear the emblems of all four American Legion Family groups – the American Legion Auxiliary, Sons of The American Legion, Legion Riders and The American Legion. The challenge coins are \$10 each, plus shipping, add \$2 per coin for standard shipping and \$13 per coin for priority shipping. To date Post NL01 has sold over 115 coins!

WASHINGTON – Veterans can again submit online applications for new identification cards through the Department of Veterans Affairs website after the system was taken down in December following rollout problems.

The purpose of the identification cards is to help veterans prove their military history without having to carry around their DD-214 certificates, which contain sensitive information. The new IDs do not replace VA medical cards or defense retiree cards, nor do they qualify as official government-issued identification.

Four Chaplains Day marks anniversary of heroic chaplains' last sacrifice for others

It's been 75 years since the U.S. Army Transport Dorchester was hit by German submarine U-223 while transporting 902 servicemen, merchant seamen and civilian workers to Greenland.

On Feb. 3, 1943. four Army chaplains on board gave their lives to save others.

"It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven," recalled one survivor, quoted in an Army history.

THE AMERICAN LEGION - WHO WE ARE

The American Legion was chartered by Congress in 1919 as a patriotic, mutual-help, and community service organization, which now numbers 2.4 million - men and women - in more than 14,000 American Legion Posts worldwide. These Posts are organized into 55 Departments - one each for the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, **France**, Mexico, and the Philippines.

The American Legion has its headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana, with offices in Washington, D.C. In addition to thousands of volunteers, serving in leadership and program implementation capacities from the communities to the Legion's standing national commissions and committees, the national organization has a professional staff of about 250 employees.

Membership eligibility in The American Legion is based on honorable service within the U.S. Armed Forces between April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918 (World War I); December 7, 1941, and December 31, 1946 (World War II); June 25, 1950, and January 31, 1955 (Korean war); December 22, 1961, and May 7, 1975 (Vietnam War); August 24, 1982, and July 31, 1984 (Lebanon/Grenada); December 20, 1989, and January 31, 1990 (Operation Just Cause – Panama); or August 2, 1990, until the date of the end of hostilities as determined by the government of the United States.



Comic strip artist Mort Walker, a World War II veteran who satirized the Army and tickled millions of newspaper readers with the antics of the lazy private "Beetle Bailey," died Jan. 27, 2018. He was 94.
